


WRARC PREZ SEZ



TOWER REMOVAL



The tower crew, AI, AB8AA, Roy, KD8IJF, Russ, NR8W, Rocky, KE8ENM and the new owner of the tower, Greg K2GRG, helped to remove a 50-foot crank up tower with a large 20 Meter beam on it.

The first thing was to get my big van in place so we had an anchor point to work from. Due to the rain the yard was a little soft. We had to use the winch to pull the van into position. Then we laid out the chains and connected them to the Tower.

Due to the position of a tree the antenna was hooked around the top of it. First thing was to remove most of the bolts that attach the tower to the base, Leaving two bolts as hinge points we started to tip the tower over. At that point the antenna was turned a little at a time to clear the tree. Once we got a quarter of the way down we added a frame to change the pull point.

Soon we were to a point where the antenna elements were near the ground. Now was the time to remove the lower element sections. Then we lowered the tower more till the elements were near the ground again and removed them. Now we had all the elements were removed from half the antenna. We again lowered the tower so we could remove the rest of the antenna.

Now was the time to remove the mast and the rotor. After that we set up the plywood and the dolly to be able to move the tower out of the back yard. With a lot of pushing and grunting, we were able to get the tower moved over so we could use the winch to pull it up the yard. Now was the time to move the van. Roy brought his truck to the driveway and we hooked a chain between the van and his truck and he pulled me up on the driveway. From here we winched the tower to the driveway, moved the trailer to the driveway and loaded the tower on the trailer. Now we had to get all the equipment picked up and stored in the van and on the trailer.

Now it was off to Greg's house on RT. 46. With Greg leading the group, we moved the tower to his house. Unloaded it onto two dollies and put it in his building, where it will be till spring. More to come in the spring when the tower will be put up. I have to thank the tower crew for all the help.

ARRL AND "NATIONAL PARKS ON THE AIR"

Last Month! This year the ARRL in partnership with the National Parks Service has begun the year long "National Parks on the Air" (NPOTA) campaign to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the National Park System. For one year, Hams are encouraged to either activate a unit of the NPS system or to chase those that have. Most of the information can be found online at: http://www.arrl.org/npota At our last general meeting some of the members indicated that they have already made contact with one or more Activators.

==> NATIONAL PARKS ON THE AIR UPDATE

A couple of milestones were reached in the ARRL National Parks on the Air (NPOTA https://npota.arrl.org/) program last week. Washington, DC-based Activator Paul Stoetzer, N8HM, became the first amateur to activate from all 28 NPOTA units in DC, completing that feat on November 7.

Pete Kobak, K0BAK, also deserves credit for activating all of the NPS units in the Eastern Pennsylvania Section. These include some difficult urban units in Philadelphia.

These are two examples of the efforts that Activators are putting forth to achieve 1 million total NPOTA contacts by year's end. Activity remains strong, with more than 25,000 contacts uploaded to Logbook of The World every week.

Fifty-four activations are scheduled for November 10-16, including Theodore Roosevelt Birthplace National Historic Site in New York, and Dry Tortugas National Park in Florida.

HIRAM PERCY MAXIM AWARD

The Hiram Percy Maxim Memorial Award is given annually to a licensed radio amateur under the age of 21. The nominee must be a current ARRL member. The nominee's accomplishments and contributions to both the community of Amateur Radio and the local community should be of the most exemplary nature. These activities may include:

- Participation or leadership in organizational affairs at the local or national level (for example: local radio club, ARES, net control, participation in civic groups);
- Technical achievement (for example: built a radio, put up an antenna, etc);
- Operating record (for example: nets, disaster drills, contests, Sweepstakes, etc);
- · Recruitment and training of new amateurs (for example: helped teach a li-

Public relations activities (for example: create a ham radio Web page).

Nomination form, supporting information, the endorsement of ARRL-affiliated clubs and elected or appointed League Leadership officials, should be submitted with the nomination to your ARRL Section Manager. In keeping with the tradition of the award when it was first established, formal nominations are made by Section Managers. Please make your Section Manager aware of young hams that have distinguished themselves through their activities. A Section Manager may nominate more than 1 person per year. All nominations shall be forwarded to the Membership & Volunteer Programs Department. An award panel will review the nominations received and select the winner. The prize consists of a cash award of \$1,500 and a suitably engraved plaque. ARRL representatives will endeavor to make a formal presentation of the plaque at a mutually agreed upon ARRL convention or event.

Nomination forms and support information should document as thoroughly as possible the Amateur Radio achievements and contributions of the nominee during the previous calendar year. Additional information concerning the accomplishments and activities of the nominee should be as complete as possible.

The award is intended to provide a tangible reward to those deserving young amateurs who contribute their time, skills and energies daily through their commitment to Amateur Radio. As models for their peers, and inspirations to us all, these fine young people are highly visible boosters of Amateur Radio awareness. We must continue to recognize and encourage their hard work and contributions at every opportunity.

Nomination forms and support information must be sent to the Section Manager. Section Managers will make the formal nomination by sending the form and information to ARRL before March 31. All additional support information must be received at ARRL on or before April 15.

There is no limit to the number of nominations an individual or club may submit to the ARRL Section Manager. For more information, contact Steve Ewald, WV1X, wv1x@arrl.org; tel 860-594-0265.

TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS

ARRL Calls on Members to Press for US Senate Passage of Amateur Radio Parity Act

ARRL once again is calling on its members to urge their US Senators to support the Amateur Radio Parity Act (H.R. 1301) when it comes up in the Senate during the "lame duck" session of Congress that adjourns in mid-December. The House of Representatives approved the bill in September, but if the Senate does not follow suit, the bill will die, and the entire process will have to be repeated. ARRL Hudson Division Director Mike Lisenco, N2YBB, who chairs the ARRL Board's Legislative Advocacy Committee and has been heavily involved in efforts to move H.R. 1301 forward, said today, "The clock is ticking."

"We begin the e-mail campaign once again, as the US Senate returns to work this week after a month-long hiatus," Lisenco said. "We were just beginning to build momentum in the Senate following the unanimous passage of the Parity Act in the House when Congress shut down for the 4 weeks prior to Election Day."

The task is simple: Go to our Rally Congress page, enter your ZIP code, fill in your name and address, press enter, and e-mails will go directly to your Senators. Members may do this, even if they have already contacted their US Senators for support.

"We have to remind our legislators that we are still here and that we need the Amateur Radio Parity Act to become law," Lisenco stressed. "We must to do this now as we have, at most, only 4 weeks left in the session to get the bill passed this year. Otherwise, we will have to begin the entire process in 2017 with a new 115th Congress."

There are no guarantees, Lisenco said, and we are subject to the political bickering that goes on daily between the parties, despite the fact that the bill is truly a bipartisan effort. "In order to have a chance at overcoming political obstacles that have little or nothing to do with the legislation, we need our voices to be heard," he said. "And we need that input today."

September's victory in the US House was the culmination of many years of effort on ARRL's part to gain legislation that would enable radio amateurs living in deed-restricted communities to erect efficient outdoor antennas that support Amateur Radio communication. The measure calls on the FCC to amend its Part 97 rules "to prohibit the application to amateur stations of certain private land-use restrictions, and for other purposes." While similar bills in past years gained some traction on Capitol Hill, it was not until the overwhelming grassroots support from the Amateur Radio community for H.R. 1301, and ARRL's relentless and strident efforts on Capitol Hill that this bill made it this far.

As the amended bill provides, "Community associations should fairly administer private land-use regulations in the interest of their communities, while nevertheless permitting the installation and maintenance of effective outdoor Amateur Radio antennas. There exist antenna designs and installations that can be consistent with the aesthetics and physical characteristics of land and structures in community associations while accommodating communications in the Amateur Radio services."

The 18th SKYWARN Recognition Day (SRD) will be held December 3, 2016 from 0000UTC to 2400UTC. SKY-WARNTM Recognition Day was developed in 1999 by the National Weather Service and the American Radio Relay League. It celebrates the contributions that SKYWARN volunteers make to the NWS mission, the protection of life and property. Amateur radio operators comprise a large percentage of the SKYWARN volunteers across the country. The Amateur radio operators also provide vital communication between the NWS and emergency management if normal communications become inoperative. During the SKYWARN Special Event operators will visit NWS offices and contact other radio operators across the world.

This year, in the week before SRD 2016, there will be a webinar that covers the basics of the event, how to participate, and a few changes that are in store for 2016. A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE BAGEL IN AMERICA

What was once a regional, ethnic food is now an American favorite. Here's a bite of bagel history.

When you think of strong, historic labor unions that helped build this country, the United Steelworkers, and the United Auto Workers probably come to mind. But Bagel Bakers Local 338—maybe not so much.

Believe it or not, this union rose to power in the early 1900s in New York City and held a firm floured hand on bagel production for decades. Jewish bakers emigrating from Eastern Europe at the turn of the century brought the bagel with them to the New World. And with the help of the union, they kept its basic recipe (flour, salt, water, yeast, sweetener) and preparation methods close to their aprons. All members were Jewish, meetings were conducted in Yiddish, and knowledge passed predominantly from father to son. Over the years, the union even staged a few bagel strikes, which hit the New York area hard. But in the 1960s, the advent of large-scale, bagel-making machines made their union obsolete.

While the bagels you'll find in our bakery cafes are larger than the original 2 to 3 cures.

While the bagels you'll find in our bakery-cafes are larger than the original 2-to-3-ounce size, come in lots of flavors beyond plain, and are stored in baskets (rather than on strings or dowels), they are still made in a very traditional, artisan manner.

Most of the bagels you see today are put in ovens within 45 minutes of being mixed. We use a sourdough base that we allow to cool and ferment for 36 to 48 hours (called 'proofing'). This really helps develop some depth of flavor. Then we place our bagels in the oven and give them a heavy steaming prior to baking. The steaming mimics the traditional boiling process used by those old Jewish bakers.

So where does all that leave us? The result is a bagel with a paper-thin crust and a center that has some real chew to it. You can't beat it.

True Story of Rudolph-the Red-Nosed-Reindeer

A man named Bob May, depressed and brokenhearted, stared out his drafty apartment window into the chilling December night.

His 4-year-old daughter Barbara sat on his lap quietly sobbing. Bob's wife, Evelyn, was dying of cancer Little Barbara couldn't understand why her mommy could never come home. Barbara looked up into her dad's eyes and asked, "Why isn't Mommy just like everybody else's Mommy?" Bob's jaw tightened and his eyes welled with tears. Her question brought waves of grief, but also of anger. It had been the story of Bob's life. Life always had to be different for Bob.

Small when he was a kid, Bob was often bullied by other boys. He was too little at the time to compete in sports. He was often called names he'd rather not remember. From childhood, Bob was different and never seemed to fit in. Bob did complete college, married his loving wife and was grateful to get his job as a copywriter at Montgomery Ward during the Great Depression. Then he was blessed with his little girl. But it was all short-lived. Evelyn's bout with cancer stripped them of all their savings and now Bob and his daughter were forced to live in a two-room apartment in the Chicago slums. Evelyn died just days before Christmas in 1938.

Bob struggled to give hope to his child, for whom he couldn't even afford to buy a Christmas gift. But if he couldn't buy a gift, he was determined to make one - a storybook! Bob had created an animal character in his own mind and told the animal's story to little Barbara to give her comfort and hope. Again and again Bob told the story, embellishing it more with each telling. Who was the character? What was the story all about? The story Bob May created was his own autobiography in fable form. The character he created was a misfit outcast like he was. The name of the character? A little reindeer named Rudolph, with a big shiny nose. Bob finished the book just in time to give it to his little girl on Christmas Day. But the story doesn't end there.

The general manager of Montgomery Ward caught wind of the little storybook and offered Bob May a nominal fee to purchase the rights to print the book. Wards went on to print, Rudolph, the Red-Nosed Reindeer and distribute it to children visiting Santa Claus in their stores. By 1946 Wards had printed and distributed more than six million copies of Rudolph. That same year, a major publisher wanted to purchase the rights from Wards to print an updated version of the book.

In an unprecedented gesture of kindness, the CEO of Wards returned all rights back to Bob May. The book became a best seller. Many toy and marketing deals followed and Bob May, now remarried with a growing family, became wealthy from the story he created to comfort his grieving daughter. But the story doesn't end there either.

Bob's brother-in-law, Johnny Marks, made a song adaptation to Rudolph. Though the song was turned down by such popular vocalists as Bing Crosby and Dinah Shore, it was recorded by the singing cowboy, Gene Autry. "Rudolph, the Red-Nosed Reindeer" was released in 1949 and became a phenomenal success, selling more records than any other Christmas song, with the exception of "White Christmas."

The gift of love that Bob May created for his daughter so long ago kept on returning back to bless him again and again. And Bob May learned the lesson, just like his dear friend Rudolph, that being different isn't so bad. In fact, being different can be a blessing. MERRY CHRISTMAS 2016
