This was my first year being able to go since it has been moved to Xenia, I know for some true Dayton fanatics Hara arena will always hold a special place in their hearts, but the Greene County Fairgrounds I think is just as wonderful. The buildings were full of people and all the big-name

vendors you would expect, and the infield of the racetrack and even out into parking areas were full of flea market vendors. I was only able to be in attendance one day this year, but it was surely worth the trip.

Now as to why I could only spend 1 day at Hamvention. We had our first license test session Saturday morning at the Boardman library. I would like to thank all the VE's that were able to attend, even though we only had one tester. A big congratulations to KE8HGT Denver for passing his Amateur Extra test with flying colors. The consensus from the VE's seemed to be all in agreeance, the library facility (at Boardman anyway) was perfect for giving tests, plenty of space, clean, and very spacious. This being our first session I would say it was successful. Now once we can improve some scheduling conflicts with classes I can see this becoming an enormous success, not just for our club, but for amateur radio.

With our first library test session done, now for the next activity. LOTA, or Libraries On the Air will be taking place June 18th from 9am-4pm EST at the Main library branch in downtown Youngstown. 305 Wick Ave, Youngstown, Ohio 44503. Everyone is welcome to come out and operate along with us, this will be a "contest" for us and a ham radio demonstration for the public. I am looking to have a few stations available so we can highlight some different ways we as hams are able to communicate. When I say contest, what that means is we have opened this up to be a nationwide event. Already we have confirmation from clubs around the country that are going to be participating with us and activating some of their local libraries. Our Youngstown Library system has been very supportive of us, and this is a little way to help give back to the library by drawing some attention to them along with excellent advertising for our ham radio community.

After our weekend of LOTA comes Field Day. This year we have moved to a different location in an attempt to draw in some more attention from the public. The Harry Meshel Picnic Area on the shore of Lake Milton is an incredible location offering lake front views, public restrooms (with flush toilets), a large open field with a few shade trees, and of course heavy traffic from the public. I am hoping for beautiful weather and lots of park usage that weekend so we can show off a little about what ham radio is and does. We will be having a basket raffle fundraiser going on this year to help support the club repeater fund. Also, we have decided to bring back the potluck dinner for Saturday evening. If you would like to participate in either of those activities by donating a basket to be raffled or to bring a dish for the potluck you can contact Maureen KD8NXS or Amanda KC3GFU. Friday at Field Day there will also be a fun little Fox Hunt. Typically, Friday has always been just a setup day with not much going on afterward, so to mix things up and get more folks out to the site a

Saturday morning like always there will be a test session for anyone looking to get their Tech license or upgrade their current license. Also Saturday afternoon, our very own member KC3GFU Amanda will be giving a presentation about Radiograms. The ARRL gives extra points to clubs who have an educational workshop at field day and Amanda has found the Radiograms and Ham radio traffic network fascinating and would like to share her excitement with all of you. That will be happening at 1pm before FD operating officially begins.

FIFID DAY 2022

Here we are starting the month of June and Field Day will be here soon. This year it will take place on the weekend of June 25-26 and we will be using the Harry Meshel Picnic Area at Lake Milton State Park for our site. We will be having a club picnic style potluck dinner this year on Sat. evening, June 25, at about 6 PM. This is a resumption of this activity after not doing one for a few years. We also will be having a Chinese Auction Basket Raffle as a fundraiser to benefit our repeater fund. Amanda and I are currently working on these things, and I wanted to pass on some information to all of you.



First off, the club will provide the hamburgers and hot dogs as in the past, with each family attending bringing a dish to share. As in the past, we have a sign-up sheet for what each family will bring. This helps keep it organized and avoids having a lot of repeat dishes from coming. This sheet started around at the May meeting and will be at the June general meeting too. If you call and get the voicemail, leave a message and I will get it. Please leave your name, call sign, dish you are bringing, number in your party, and contact info in case I have to get back to you about anything related.

This year we will not have a rented tent or tables and chairs. Therefore, we will be in need of many fold out tables and pop up canopies to accommodate the food set up, seating for dining, and the Chinese Auction. An exact number is not determined yet. Please let Chris WF8U or Bob N8RCM know if you have any that could be used. It would be greatly appreciated! Each individual one of us will have to bring our own folding/camping/lawn chairs to sit on. Please remember to bring one with you for each member of your party as there may not be any extra to give out. We do not know if we will have use of the picnic pavilion there as it is first come first served and someone else may get it first, so we have to prepare as if we are not using it. Scoring: Phone = 1 QSO Point

Digital = 2 QSO Points CW = 3 QSO Points

Library Class = 5x Multiplier

QRP (5 watts or less) = 2x Multiplier

Awards: Awards will be given to all participants.

Encyclopedia = 5,000+ Points Novel = 2,500-4,999 Points

AMATEUR RADIO NEWS FROM AROUND THE WORLD

Amateur Radio Club Helps Teach Survival Skills

Members of the All Things Amateur Radio Association (ATARA-W8ATR), a family-oriented radio club in the foothills of southern Ohio, were in Lancaster on Saturday, April 30, to help support the Afterschool Programs of Lancaster with their Family Survival Day at Alley Park.

Along with some radio related activities, ATARA provided instruction for the National Association for Search and

Rescue's Hug-A-Tree program, explained what to do if you are lost in the woods, as well as taught families how a trash bag can keep you warm and dry. There were also primitive fire-starting demonstrations where families could learn how to use magnesium bars, char cloth, and jute.

The families visited a Parks on the Air® (POTA) station and listened as contacts were made across the country with stations in the Dominican Republic and Puerto Rico. Oscillating Keyers were also set up for the families to key their names in Morse code.

There were 80 participants and 30 volunteers. ATARA is an ARRL Affiliated Club.

ARES® Activated in Oklahoma for Tornado Clean-Up Communications

To help with emergency communications support following an outbreak of tornadoes that hit this past week, the Oklahoma Department of Emergency of Management and Homeland Security requested support from the Oklahoma Amateur Radio Emergency Service® (ARES®).

During the first week of May, 12 tornadoes touched down in the central and eastern parts of Oklahoma. The tornado that struck Seminole, Oklahoma, on Wednesday, May 4, left EF2 damage, according to the National Weather Service. That tornado was a mile wide, and its path totaled 31 miles.

The request for amateur radio emergency communications support from the Oklahoma ARES was made on Thursday, May 5, 2022. ARES was activated on Saturday May 7, 2022. Seven amateur radio operators were active, providing voice communications between chainsaw and debris removal teams from their base at Seminole State College's volunteer center.

ARRL Oklahoma Section Emergency Coordinator Mark Conklin, N7XYO, said the clean-up crews worked quickly, and ARES was needed for 8 hours until cellular and wired communications were restored.

There were no deaths or injuries during the tornado outbreak, but clean up continues.

Armed Forces Day Crossband Test Successful

The 2022 Armed Forces Day Crossband Test, held May 14, produced impressive results. Frank Donovan, W3LPL, reports good band conditions and participation resulted in over 800 contacts with 330 on Single Side Band (SSB).

"Cooperation of amateurs, as secondary users of 60 meters, was outstanding, with no interference," said Donovan. "All of the 24 stations that signed up for the exercise were active at some point."

Here is the detailed NSS band-by-band QSO breakdown:

80 meters: 20 CW, 35 SSB = 55 total 60 meters: 21 CW, 169 SSB = 190 total 40 meters: 85 CW, 87 SSB = 172 total

30 meters: 54 CW = 54 total

20 meters: 151 CW, 165 SSB = 316 total

Total contacts: 331 CW, 456 SSB = 787 grand total

Historic US Navy call sign NSS in Annapolis, Maryland was operated by the U.S. Naval Academy Amateur Radio Club, supported by members of the Potomac Valley Radio Club (PVRC), and produced 331 CW and 456 SSB contacts from the location of the 1918 NSS Naval Radio station.

NSS QSL cards are available from K3LU. A self-addressed stamped envelope (SASE) will be appreciated.
